# **Coaches Needed for Robotics Program**

For the second year, Shepherd Elementary parents are organizing teams to participate in an extracurricular robotics program designed to stimulate children's interest in science. The **FIRST Lego League** (**FLL**) and the **Junior FIRST Lego League** (**JFLL**) are operated by the non-profit organization FIRST, "For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology".

FIRST was founded by the creator of the Segway Human Transporter machine that tourists and local police use on city streets. The organization introduces children to science and technology through hands-on experiences with robotics.

The JFLL is designed for kids 6 to 9 years old and is based on a modification of the robotics competition FIRST operates for older children and teens. Using an open-ended LEGO building set, the children will design a model depicting an aspect of this year's "Nano Quest" Challenge, designed to explore the world of cutting-edge nanotechnology. Children will spend several months exploring, investigating,

## **Planting Party will make SES Blossom**

The PTA's **Building & Grounds Committee** is currently focused on improving the landscaping around our school. Frank Borris heads the group and plans to put the recent **donation from the Shepherd Park Citizens' Association** to good use by adding some new plantings this fall.


Frank has taken pictures and measurements of the campus and visited Meadows Farms last weekend to take advantage of their free landscaping consulting. He has asked them for selections that will add some much needed color and texture, but requiring as little maintenance as possible. The committee will start planting some shrubs on September 8th with more to follow in 2 week increments.

Frank says, "We will not simply stick plants in the ground. Rather, we will take our time and properly prepare the planters (removing clay and adding fertile soil) to ensure our shrubs and trees have the best opportunity to thrive. The plan is to start with the two areas on either side of the entrance to the old wing at Kalmia and 14th."

Most importantly, plots will be identified so a family, individual, or organization can adopt clearly defined area in which to plant. Adopting a plot is a commitment to maintain the planting area to include basic maintenance such as watering, aerating, weeding, mulching, trimming, and any other services appropriate.

# **UPDATE: Classroom Clean-Up & Beautification**

For our returning families, you may recall in our last Scoop issue in June, we called on you to assist with all aspects of the classroom moves. Thank you to those families who brought in boxes and supplies for the teachers. Initially, the school and PTA had anticipated only three days were needed (June 16, 23, and July 11) to move the teachers into their new classroom locations. But as we looked in closets, dug around classrooms, and ventured into the basement, we quickly learned that the task was actually quite enormous and needed to be tackled immediately.

Messages were sent by word of mouth and email to enlist the help of parents and the community throughout the summer months to complete the long-overdue clean-up and make-over. This initiative ran in parallel to the professional renovations being implemented both inside and outside by vendors hired by DCPS. Several volunteers were here daily, some came every weekend, and others dropped by to lend a hand whenever they could. It was a long summer!

Now, as you walk around the school this week, we hope you'll find these changes have improved the

Children will spend several months exploring, investigating, designing and building a model made with LEGO bricks. In conjunction, teams create a "Show Me" poster that depicts the teams' experience during this process, through drawings and words.

JFLL introduces children to the concepts of teamwork and basic design skills, creating an initial interest and hands-on approach to science and technology through the familiarity and fun of LEGO building. The goal is to provide an experience that will begin to transform youngsters and open their eyes to the possibilities of improving the world around them through acknowledgement, thought, planning and technology.

This year, Shepherd will form one JFLL team and operate at least one **FLL team for children over the age of 9.** Both teams will do the same thing, but FLL team will use a more complex robot building kit and can attend **regional competitions** with other teams.

This year's theme is "Power Puzzle." How do our personal energy choices to heat our homes, fuel our cars, charge our cell phones, power our computers, or even download music to our iPods impact the environment, economy, and life around the globe? Which resources should we use and why? Teams will explore how energy production and consumption choices affect the planet and our quality of life today, tomorrow, and for future generations.

At the moment we have 3 coaches from last year, but we need more. If you are able to volunteer for 2-3 set hours a week until December and would be willing to attend showcases and competitions in DC or the Mid-Atlantic area in early 2008, PLEASE VOLUNTEER TO COACH!

Knowledge of science or technology is not required but is helpful. You may decide when your team will meet. We expect that teams will be able to meet at the school after class hours. We also need one parent to assist each coach.

#### DPR Fall 2007 activity guide now available

The DC Department of Parks and Recreation's (DPR) Fall 2007 guide features activities and events for children, teens, adults, families and seniors, as well as specialized programs for people with disabilities.

In addition to the traditional athletic and recreational fall programming, DPR is now offering some new classes this season including Clowning Around, a clown college for youth ages 13 to 16; Hand Dance Instruction for Young Men, where students will learn the techniques of hand dancing; Children's Theatre, where participants will be taught acting skills and will perform throughout the city; and Silvah Sistahs, a performing arts troupe for active seniors, ages 55 and older.
