The teacher asked the students to name people who have been important in the history of the United States and to describe some of the values important to these people. Then each student picked one of the values and drew a picture to represent that value. Once everyone was finished, the children tied the pictures together to create a quilt.

The class was also treated to a tour of the Cathedral with stops to visit important people and events in the history of the United States. One of the most popular was a statue of the Reverend Dr. Martin
