Late arrivers and students who are dismissed early miss out on valuable instructional time.

Congratulations to Ms. Shaibu's class for having 13 days of perfect attendance during the month of January and to Ms. Johnson's class who had 12 days. I would also like to recognize Ms. Shaibu's class for having 8 days with no tardies and Mr. Byers' class who had 4 days with no tardies. Each of these classes will be receiving a pizza party. As you can see we have made some progress but there is still a lot of work to be done. Please continue to work to get your student(s) to school on time. 

Shepherd Lower Field Focus Of Community Meeting

There will be a community meeting next Thursday, Feb. 19, from 7:30 to 9 p.m. at the Shepherd Elementary auditorium on potential improvements to both Shepherd Field, (a D.C. Parks and Recreation facility alongside Shepherd Elementary School), and Marvin Caplan Park (the "triangular park" bordering 13th and Holly Streets and Alaska Avenue), with an eye to improving recreational opportunities in the Shepherd Park neighborhood.

Shepherd IB-PYP Corner

Update:

- This week some of the grade level teams are beginning to draft their first full PYP planner for the unit of inquiry that will take place during the last six weeks of school.
- The full faculty met last Friday morning to discuss ways to introduce the Learner Profile attributes to their students. They also enacted the Learner Profile reflection that was in last week's *Mustang*.
- Teachers received their username and password for accessing the IB Organization's "Online Curriculum Centre."

PYP Lesson of the Week: The Online Curriculum Centre*

What is the Online Curriculum Centre, and how is it different from the IBO's public web site? The International Baccalaureate Organization maintains a public web site at www.ibo.org. There is a wealth of information on this site. The public may read about the three IB programs – the Primary Years Program, the Middle Years Program and the Diploma Program. Many of the handbooks for these programs are found on the public web site, along with a listing of IB teacher workshops and a profile of every IB authorized schools across the globe. From this website the public may link to the Online Curriculum Centre, where one finds information about the site. However, to enter the site and view the information therein, one must have a username and password.

So, the online curriculum centre (OCC) is a password-protected IB website designed to support teachers and coordinators of the three IB programs. In the OCC they can find:

- IB publications for the three IB programmes* (curriculum guides, coordinator notes, and, in some cases, teacher support materials)
- news items and important information
- discussion forums for IB teachers to communicate freely with other IB teachers
- teacher-generated resources—share your own resources with other IB teachers
- support areas for special educational needs, librarians, academic honesty and calculators
- online subject specialists (online faculty members) to answer curriculum and assessment queries
- a real-time chat facility (in the discussion forums).

The OCC can be viewed in English, French or Spanish. The Middle Years Programme section can be viewed in Chinese.

Literacy Corner

1. Visualizing Activity: Poem Pictures

Choose a favorite poem or nursery rhyme. Read it together several times for enjoyment and to become more familiar with the ideas. Talk about how words can make a picture in your mind. Then, have your child choose one line from the poem, and draw the picture they saw in their mind.

Example: "Hey Diddle, Diddle"

Hey diddle, diddle,
The cat and the fiddle.
The cow jumped over the moon.
The little dog laughed to see such a sight,
And the dish ran away with the spoon!



The cow jumped over the moon.

2. Cartoon Writing

Explanation:

Cartoons are an entertaining way to help children develop as readers and writers. The pictures in cartoons provide a context of support for writing. Drawing the cartoon pictures first, engages children in the entire process of writing.

Example 1:

Make a photocopy of a cartoon from the newspaper. Take out the text. Have your child look at the cartoon and tell you about the pictures. Tell a story for what is happening in the pictures. Write captions for each cartoon cell.

Example 2:

Have your child tell you a short story. Decide how many cartoon frames you need to tell your story. Draw each frame. Now add the text to each frame.


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Trivia Corner — Just for Fun!

Free Family Film Night at Washington Ethical Society

"The Great Debaters," which was directed by and stars Denzel Washington, is the movie in the "Free Family Film Event" sponsored by the Washington Ethical Society, 7750 16th Street NW near Kalmia Road. The movie will be shown at 7 p.m. Friday, February 27.

The movie tells the story of Dr. Melvin B. Tolson, a professor at Wiley College in Marshall, Texas, where, in 1935-36, inspired by the Harlem Renaissance and his clandestine work as a union organizer, Tolson coaches the debate team to a nearly undefeated season that sees the first debate between U.S. students from white and "Negro" colleges and ends with an invitation to face Harvard University's national champions. The team of four, which includes a female student and a very young James Farmer, is tested in a crucible heated by Jim Crow, sexism, a lynch mob, an arrest and near-riot, a love affair, jealousy and a national radio audience.

"The Great Debaters" is rated PG-13 and two suggestive scenes will be edited from the film. The big plus is a question-and-answer session with Shepherd Park neighbors Ken and Joigie Tolson. Ken is the grandson of Melvin Tolson. Light refreshments will be served.
