Volunteer Corps

As of the first day of school, we had 333 students enrolled at Shepherd. That means close to 650 parents, not to mention aunts, uncles and grandparents all taking a keen interest in these kids' education. One way you can help the school is to volunteer. On top of helping Shepherd, it sets a fine example for our children. Here are some volunteer opportunities. Some call for an ongoing commitment, some call for helping just once, and some have deadlines — meaning that the whole school community will notice if it doesn't get done. Here's how you can help:

- We're still looking for a fourth-grader or a fifth-grader -- with their parents' OK, of course -- who is willing to write a weekly column for our free neighborhood newspaper, the Northwest Current. A student correspondent for the paper's "School Dispatches" section would need to write about 150 words each week. Why should kids from schools that THINK they're better than ours get all the ink? The deadline is noon on Friday for publication the following Wednesday - turning in your column before heading to school on Friday would be a smart idea. If you or your child are interested in pursuing this opportunity, contact Mark Pattison at 829-9289 or
- We're looking for one or more parents who can go to the office on Thursday afternoons and print the Mustang for those families who have requested a paper copy. An original version of the Mustang should already be on hand at the office. Ms. Brooks, the school's office manager, will give you a quick tutorial on the copier which also does the stapling for you. Last year, copying the newsletter and bundling copies for

- teacher mailboxes (and eventual student delivery) took about an hour. We expect it will take less time now that Shepherd is switching to an "opt-in" system for receiving hard copies of the newsletter. The more parents who volunteer, the fewer times you'll be asked to do it, and we can set up a rotation. - Shepherd still needs a parent to change the signs on the marquee outside of school. Once the PTA meeting is over next week, all the details on the marquee become obsolete. You supply the Allen wrench to get into the sign, and we'll supply you with what gets said on the marquee; Ms. Brooks will supply you with the letters and numbers. - The Mustang could use two parents who would be willing to edit the newsletter once a month. It could also use at least one parent to do the layout and design on a rotating basis with the one or two parents we've got tentatively lined up, so no parents get burned out by the effort. Layout-and-design parents would benefit from knowing Microsoft Publisher, but it's not mandatory (although one parent taught herself!). Our rotating team of editors need to know where to go to get the school news, as well as using all of the English grammar principles YOU learned in school! - One parent has already stepped up to volunteer to handle the used uniform clothing sale at next week's Back-to-School Night/PTA meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 16, but we need at least one more parent who can commit to coming to school before 6:15 p.m. that day to take the clothing from the parent room and display it properly on long tables in the back of the auditorium. Reminder to Fill Out School Directory Form

We are on track to get the school directory issued during the first week of November. But we need your input to make it complete.

You may still have the form for you to authorize placement of your family's contact information in the annual school directory -- with separate lines for address, home phone, work phones, cell phones and e-mail addresses. You may also have the Aug. 28 issue of the Mustang which contained a copy of the form. You can fill either one out. If you can't find either, your class parent should have copies of this form to send as an attachment to an e-mail.

Once it's completed, put it in the PTA box in the main office of the school. Class parents can also collect the completed forms en masse and deposit them in the PTA box.

`180 Fund' Is How We Help Shepherd School

Remember: You're already in the PTA just by being a parent of a Shepherd Elementary student. There are no PTA dues to pay. But in order to pay for items we as parents consider essential to our children's education — but that D.C. Public Schools can't or won't pay for — the PTA has established the "180 Fund." Why this name? There are 180 instructional days in the school year. Parents, can you afford a dollar per day per child to improve Shepherd Elementary? We think you can, and we hope you'll contribute to the 180 Fund.

It's proven to be popular with parents in the early going. More than

\$10,000 in checks have been turned in even before Labor Day rolled around. But we need to continue the momentum. The PTA needs about \$100,000 to pay for the things that school and PTA leaders have identified as necessary for 2009-10.

These include the plastic folders that were provided to each student at the start of the school year to facilitate communication between the school and the home; the redesigned Shepherd Elementary Web site -www.shepherd-elementary.org -- with individual Web pages coming for each teacher; Discovery Education software for the school (available at a 50 percent discount because a Shepherd parent works for Discovery Communications); workshops and seminars conducted by renowned International Baccalaureate educator John Burnell; "white boards" to augment and supplement the school's blackboards; and more laptop computers for teacher use.

We don't expect every penny of our revenue goal to come from the 180 Fund. School fundraising activities account for about half of all PTA income. But if you'd rather not have to partake in fundraising activities, you can contribute \$500 to the PTA and consider yourself exempt from fundraising for the rest of the school year.

You can pay into the 180 Fund in one lump sum, but if you need to budget your payments, you can make either 10 monthly payments (\$18 or \$50), or two per-semester payments (\$90 or \$250).

Make your checks payable to Shepherd Elementary PTA. You can drop an envelope with the check inside to the PTA box inside the main office. Or, if you'd rather mail it to the school, its address is: Shepherd Elementary School PTA, 7800 14th St. NW, Washington, DC 20012.

Here's one hint: Bring your checkbook to next Wednesday's PTA meeting. We'll have copies of the 180 Fund form you can fill out and attach a check to.

Countdown to 'Opt-In' On Mustang Starts Now

Do you want to read a stapled, printed-on-both-sides-of-the-page Mustang and hold it in your hand — and keep it by the house for ready reference? We're cool with that, but you MUST "opt in." What we mean is that you must fill out the coupon below, saying you want to continue getting the Mustang through your child's backpack.

Because of the publishing problems last week with the Mustang, we're delaying the start of the countdown until now.

That means The first fully opt-in Mustang distribution will take place with the Oct. 2 issue.

We don't like to admit this often, but sometimes the Washington Post does something right: They gave their subscribers three weeks' notice so they could opt in to continue receiving its TV listings book with the Sunday paper. We're copying them with our own three weeks' notice.

A week from now, you'll see a twoweeks' notice. A week after that, you'll get a one-week's notice. Fill out the form and put it in the PTA box in the school office.

It's easy as that if you want to continue receiving a hard-copy version of the Mustang.

There are two tree-saving ways to see it electronically, though: Through the school's Web site -- www.shepherd-elementary.org — and through notice given on the PTA's listserv.

The really cool thing is that you don't even have to say you're from Shepherd to qualify for the discount. Anybody who comes in next Friday evening is donating 50 percent of their purchase price to the PTA. Earlier we asked, "After all, wouldn't Grandma and Grandpa or Aunt Louise like a masterpiece from the hands of your child?" Well, maybe they'd like to come with your family. Last year — the first year we tried this — the PTA got \$800 from Color Me Mine, and we think we can do even better this year.

Catalog Fundraiser: Just 2 Weeks Left!

We have just two weeks left of our first fundraising opportunity of the year! Let's bring the "Year of Supporting Shepherd" in with a bang and the best part is you don't have to use your money! UOPM -- Use Other People's Money -- to help support Shepherd! Chances are the items that people buy are items they would be buying anyway ... and this way they are helping our school in the process.

Most, if not all of you, have received the QSP (formerly Reader's Digest) Fundraising packets. Each student's minimum goal is only 15 items (but you don't have to stop there!). Magazine note: If you are ordering magazines via the order form, just fill out the blue and white (main) order form to purchase a particular magazine. It is actually quicker to do it online. If you do it through the order form they would have to wait until the orders come back then they get a voucher that they send in THEN they start to receive their magazines. If you do it online it starts almost immediately. The magazine postcard booklet is simply used as an offer for people that may like to purchase their magazines through the school. Fill in the names of friends and family and information will be mailed to them on how they can order magazines for themselves or as gifts to others.

You can also opt out of selling! How? You can make a check for \$500 payable to Shepherd Elementary PTA, drop it off in the PTA box in the main office and -- or if you have already done so -- you can totally disregard this message!

- All classrooms have been stocked with hand sanitizer.

- Precautionary measures have been discussed with students (cover your mouth, wash your hands, sneeze into your arm, etc.).
- We have a fulltime nurse who can do a quick assessment of students if they posses any of the H1N1 symptoms.
- Sick children are sent home.
- Restrooms, sinks and water fountains are sanitized daily.
- Restrooms are cleaned, restocked and disinfected every two hours.
- If you have questions or would like further information and updates regarding H1N1, go to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention website at www.cdc.gov/h1n1 or call 311. Callers outside of the District of Columbia should dial 202-737-4404 for information.

As a parent we ask that you do the following:

- Teach your child about hand washing and covering their mouths with tissue or their elbow.
- Teach your child to not share personal items
- If you child has symptoms of the flu, keep them home.

School Safety Tips

Our schools are centers of the community as well as centers of learning. Our schools should also be centers of an active partnership for promoting neighborhood safety. Here are some ideas on how you can help keep your children, your school and your neighborhood safe.

• Check Your Children's Route to School for Hazards.

Vacant buildings, abandoned cars and uncleared vacant lots can pose a danger to your children. Not only can these seem to your children to be exciting places to play, they can often become centers for criminal activity. Another benefit of walking with your children to school is that it can help to identify such conditions on your children's route to and from school and report them to your beat officers or school administrator. Working together with the police and other city agencies, you can ensure that these kinds of hazards are removed from your neighborhood.

• Make Sure Your Children Are in School Every Day.

Youngsters are most likely to get into trouble when they are not in school when they should be. Sit down and have a 10-minute conversation with your children every day about what they did in school. Not only will this help you to ensure that your children are going to school, it can help you identify problems or challenges that your children may be facing and help them to address those problems. Also, make sure that your children's school has a well-developed anti-truancy policy that can help you address truancy problems should they occur.

• Ensure That Your Children Have Something to do and Somewhere to Go to After School.

There are a variety of activities available to broaden your children's interests and abilities as well as provide a safe place to be after school. Shepherd offers the Star Achievers after-care program which contains a wide variety of activities. Perhaps your child wants to try out for basketball or track. In addition, the recreational parks sponsors a wide range of activities at park facilities throughout the city. Other programs include the Metropolitan Police Department's Girls and Boys Club.

 Attend Your Child's School Parent and Teacher Meetings.

The PTA and Local School Restructuring Team (LSRT) meetings can both celebrate and enhance parents, teachers meetings can follow cases of concern to the community through the court process. Working with the subcommittee, parent groups can help ensure that the court system imposes stiff penalties for violations of Safe Zone laws.


