# Cool Black History Facts

- •Black History Month originated in 1926 by Carter Godwin Woodson as Negro History Week. The month of February was chosen in honor of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln, both born in that month.
- •Elijah McCoy (1843 1929) invented an automatic lubricator for oiling steam engines in 1872. The term "the real McCoy" is believed to be a reference about the reliability of Elijah McCoy's invention.
- •Garrett Augustus Morgan (1877 1963) invented, among many other things, a 3-way automatic stop sign, which he sold to General Electric. It was used in the U.S. until the 3-light traffic sign was developed.
- •George Carruthers (1939 ) invented the far ultraviolet electrographic camera, used in the 1972 Apollo 16 mission. This invention revealed new features of Earth's far-outer atmosphere and deep-space objects from the perspective of the lunar surface. Carruthers was inducted into the National Inventor's Hall of Fame in 2003.
- Mark Dean (1957 ) along with his co-inventor Dennis Moelle created a microcomputer system with bus control means for peripheral processing devices. This invention allows the use of computer plug-ins like disk drives, speakers, scanners, etc...
- •<u>Dr. Charles Drew</u> (1904 1950) discovered techniques to store blood and developed blood banks.
- •Sarah E. Goode (1850 ?) invented a bed that folded up into a cabinet in 1885. Contrary to popular belief, she was not the first African-American woman to receive a patent, but the second.
- •Lewis and Clark were accompanied by York, a black slave, when they made their 1804 expedition from Missouri to Oregon. York's presence aided in their interactions with the Native Americans they encountered.
- •According to the American Community Survey, in 2005 there were **2.4 million black military** veterans in the United States -the highest of any minority group.
- •Booker T. Washington (1856 1915) was the first African-American to be honored on a U.S. stamp, in
- •Ben Carson (1951 ) a skilled neurosurgeon, led the first successful operation to separate a pair of Siamese twin infants who were joined at the back of the head in 1987.

# What is a Shelterbox?

Besides a fundraiser for Shepherd Elementary school. it is truly amazing what one 49-gallon Shelterbox can hold:

- One ten-person tent, including two fabric interior privacy partitions, outer fly-sheet and repair kit.
   These tents are considered 'winter suitable' by international relief standards.
- Vinyl insulated sleeping mats and lightweight thermal blankets. More compact than sleeping bags, these mats and blankets have multiple uses. The blanket can also be fashioned to catch water, as a tarp, etc. while the mat also serves as a ground 'table' for meals, or tentrugs.
- One pack of 180 water purification tablets or a water purification kit; and one 5 gallon flat-pack water container (Each tablet will purify a full container of water providing 1,800 gallons of clean drinking water which should be sufficient for a family of ten for up to threemonths).
- Two 2.1-gallon, collapsible, plastic water carriers.
- One collapsible trenching shovel
- 164 feet of rope
- Repellant-treated mosquito netting
- Ten PVC Ponchos/ ten HD plastic bags
- Tool kit in canvas bag: hatchet, jackknife, screwdriver, hammer, hoe head, etc.
- Multi-fueled cook stove, Eating utensils: enamel plates/cups
- Children's activity kit-simple school supplies, stickers and coloring book

And the Shelterbox itself, once emptied, can be used as water tank, food store, cot, table, etc.

CNN featured Shelterbox in a report Jan. 21, describing its contents and having a few in camera range outside a hospital in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. Because the hospital itself was damaged in the quake, and because the need for medical care is outstripping the available space at the hospital, several Shelterbox tents were set up outside the hospital. (The tents don't look anything like camping pup tents, but more like mini-domes supported by lightweight tubing.) Hospital personnel can put two or three patients inside a Shelterbox tent, as well as the medical equipment and supplies they need to help heal them.

Shepherd's goal was to collect \$1,000 for the Shelterbox drive. If Shepherd gets \$1,000, it will be able to track the Shelterbox's delivery in Haiti. (If Shepherd does not collect \$1,000, it can join with another school to reach the goal.)

# Shepherd, Others Aim For Global Curriculum

Editor's note: Yes, it's true! "Applications Seek Approval to



Offer IB Programs," said the secondary headline in the Jan. 24 issue of the Northwest Current. Shepherd's been on a good streak when it comes to coverage in northwest D.C.'s free weekly, and when there's good news to share, we share it. Following is the story, written by Current staff writer Jessica Gould.

As globalization continues to link communities across the world, more city schools are implementing internationally driven curricula.

In Northwest, three D.C. public schools are in the process of applying to become International Baccalaureate programs.

Shepherd Elementary in Shepherd Park and H.D. Cooke Elementary in Adams Morgan have completed the second stage of the application. They are now awaiting visits from International Baccalaureate officials to determine whether the program suits their schools.

Meanwhile, Tenleytown's Deal Middle is in the final stage of its application. It hosted program officials last fall and expects a decision from the International Baccalaureate organization within the next few months.

So what is this sought-after program?

From its headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland, the International Baccalaureate foundation offers programs for children ages 3 through 19. According to the group's Web site, the mission is to provide all students with "The intellectual, personal emotional and social skills to live, learn and work in a rapidly globalizing world."

There are more than 775,000 "IB" students at 2,815 schools in 138 countries, the Web site says. The curriculum is already in place at D.C.'s public Benjamin Banneker Academic High School, as well as three private schools in the city -- Washington International School, British School of Washington and Archbishop Carroll high School.

Deal parent Dianne Torresen said there are plenty of appealing qualities about the International Baccalaureate program, including its emphasis on foreign language, its high standards and its cohesive curriculum. But, she said, "the downside is that (the application process) is an amazing amount of work."

For example, in seeking to host the "primary years program," Shepherd Elementary principal Jamie Miles said, Shepherd had to write and implement a formal language and assessment policy, and provide evaluators with an army of details about the school, from the number of books in the library to how much time students spend in each class.

Miles said the next step is the authorization visit from a team if "IB experts" who will interview a diverse group of people - from Shepherd's leadership, teachers and students to D.C. Public Schools' central office staff.

Miles called the application a "monumental" task but said becoming an International Baccalaureate school would be well worth the effort. "When this journey began, individuals were looking for something different. They were looking for something that would meet the diverse needs of the student population and set the school apart from other schools in the District," she wrote in an e-mail. "That desire continues today."

In fact, Schools Chancellor Michelle Rhee has said it's her goal for district schools to offer a wider array of specialized programs.

Parent Donna Johnson Harvey said she thinks bringing the International Baccalaureate program to Shepherd will help achieve that vision. "We're hoping for her continued support," she said of the chancellor.

Harvey added that a curriculum focused on respect for various cultures simply makes sense in the diverse Ward 4 community.

H.D. Cooke principal Kathleen Black said she feels the same way about her Adams Morgan school.

The International Baccalaureate program's "tenets encourage both global awareness and appreciation of the world around us," she said. "This is particularly important because of the diversity that is (surrounding) our school community."

Black said she is waiting to hear when a site visit will take place.



# PTA Meeting Highlights

Couldn't make last month's PTA meeting? Here are some of the highlights you missed -- until now!

Mark Murphy of D.C. Public Schools' new "Early Stages" program made a brief presentation. The program is headquartered at the Walker-Jones Center. It's for children ages 2-5 who may have developmental difficulties. Children need not be enrolled in D.C. Public Schools to take advantage of the program, merely D.C. residents.
