From the PTA President...

Dear Shepherd Parents,

The news came out Friday morning that D.C. Public Schools was scrapping the "Saturday Scholars" program to help boost DC-CAS test scores. A DCPS memo, according to the Washington Post, cited "limited effectiveness," as well as low attendance and budget pressures.

Our experience at Shepherd has proven different.

When we took part in Saturday Scholars two years ago, we had fine attendance. More importantly, it met the program's criterion of honest-to-goodness effectiveness.

With the news that Saturday Scholars has been discontinued, I have to tip my cap to Shepherd's parents and staff for devising the Afterschool Academy, which starts this week. We were smart to not wait for DCPS to do some heavy lifting for us; see what it would have gotten us?

We expect high attendance; our students are already in school. We expect effectiveness, based on the results we achieved two years ago. Participation and achievement are two areas central to fulfilling Shepherd's mission. As for the DCPS bugaboo of budget pressures, we feel them. We all feel them. The school squeezed out nearly

A Word from Mrs. Miles!

Greetings Shepherd Family,

DCBAS

The 3rd DCBAS assessment took place on January 11-13, 2011. Thank you for working to get your students to school on time, even on the day it snowed. The students were focused and reported to me that they did a good job. Preliminary results show progress in many areas but we can also clearly see the areas where we need to focus and devise a plan of action. Teachers will be sharing the final results with you in upcoming weeks.

Snow Days

As most of you know, we rarely (I am hesitant to say never) miss school or delay school because of snow. If the TV says, "DCPS-No Report" that means DCPS is on a normal schedule. If there is a closing or delay, the TV will report, "DCPS Closed or 2 hour delay." The DCPS website will report nothing or occasionally it will report, "DCPS Open On-Time. In the event of inclement weather, I will send a call out between 7:30 a.m and 8:00 a.m. informing you of the status for the day. I urge you to listen to the message, versus calling the school because the school called you. On average, we receive anywhere between 75-100 calls between 7:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. asking if school is in session. You can also go to the DCPS website and sign up to receive e-alerts about delays and school closings.

Clothing

As stated in a previous message, it is our goal to go outside for recess every single day. Last week, the students had a fabulous time walking and playing in

Angry Child? Fix the Behavior, Not the Feelings by James Lehman, MSW

Many parents make the mistake of assuming that since their child's behavior is connected to their feelings, fixing the feelings will fix the behavior. Unfortunately, nothing could

be further from the truth. It's critical for parents to understand that processing your child's feelings while they are happening is not constructive. Children become overwhelmed with emotions, and by the time they're feeling angry or resentful, you're already way

into a negative situation. The time to teach kids about fire safety is not when the curtains are burning. In the same way, appropriate behavior is best learned before the crisis. And make no bones about it, if your child is screaming, yelling or punching things, you are already in crisis mode. I like to remind parents that the Chinese symbol for crisis is a combination of the characters for "danger" and "opportunity." So when your child acts out, although it's a dangerous situation, also remember that it presents a good opportunity for learning to take place.

Many parents try to deal with their child's emotions first because they believe that's where the bad behavior is coming from. If your child gets angry and smashes his sister's dollhouse, asking him, "Why did you get angry?" or "Why did you do that?" is ineffective. It focuses on the emotion or the act itself, not the child's thinking behind the behavior, which is what you really need to address. Your goal is to help your

child solve the problem from which his feelings emanate, the thinking that sparks the emotion. The key is to focus on the underlying thinking and the faulty problem-solving that triggers the whole crisis.

It's important to acknowledge that most kids solve problems by being compliant. For instance, when you tell one child, "You can't ride your bike, it's too close to dinner," that child might shrug and say, "OK," and come into the house. But some kids solve problems by being defiant. If you tell another child exactly the same thing, he might answer you with, "I don't care. Ben rides his bike! Why do I have to do this?" He

starts raising his voice, getting more and more frustrated and angry. The underlying thought for the kid who acts out is probably something like, "This isn't fair, you don't have the right to stop me, other parents let their kids do it," or some other thought which triggers a negative emotional response. Focusing this kid on his feelings of anger and frustration will not change his behavior.

Instead, you have to focus him instead on the original thought or per-

ception that made him think your direction wasn't fair, and the inappropriate behavior he used to solve the problem of "fairness." In life, the problem for everyone—including your child—is that things are not always going to feel fair. There's injustice in life, and injustice leads to frustration. Or there are times when you want to do something, but it's just not the right time. And that can lead to frustration and anger for your child if he doesn't process it the right way.

How do you start effecting this change in your child's perceptions? The next time your child acts out, instead of asking him why he did it, try saying, "Let's look at what you do when you get angry." That way, you're teaching him that he's angry and getting him to look at what he's doing

with the anger. The primary goal of behavioral change is to get people to do something different when they're upset, angry or afraid. The next step is to ask,



"The next time this happens, what can you do differently?" Don't try to tell him, "You shouldn't feel this way," or "Those feelings aren't valid." Just say, "The next time you feel this way, what can you do differently?" It's a very different process than the one that begins with "Why do you feel that way?" or "Why did you do that?" When you ask those questions, you're going to get all the excuses and justifications, which are so detrimental to actual problem-solving.

Make the shift. Focus on your child's thinking, not his emotions. This is the most powerful step you can make toward changing his behavior.

caused by the election of Kwame Brown as council chair. Brown had served as an at-large councilmember, but with his ascent (made possible by Vincent Gray's mayoral run), the vacancy was created.

One of the things we are focused on, as a school full of inquirers, is asking questions to drive our learning. In the library, every read-aloud session is punctuated with a number of questions, and even a

few answers. All questions, however, are not created equal. When it comes to books, some questions are fairly easy, as the answers are right there in the text, with the words usually found in the same sentence: What did the Very Hungry Caterpillar eat on Tuesday?

When was George Washington born? Other questions are a bit harder, requiring you to look in more than one place and put the information together: What are some of the things robots are used for?


What are some of the words Charlotte wrote in her web? The most challenging types of questions require you to read and think about what is in the book, and respond to it with your own opinions and/ or experiences: How do you think your life would be different if you lived in a medieval castle (when

reading a nonfiction book about castles and medieval life)? What do you think might have happened at the stroke of midnight if Cinderella hadn't run away from the prince and he'd seen her in her rags?

By now, you may well have a ques-

tion of your own: what on earth is she going on about? What is all this talk about questions? Well, as Mrs. Miles mentioned in a previous issue of The

Mustang, we are planning a (still unnamed - any suggestions?) reading program this year, one with a twist.

The twist is that, instead of answering the types of questions that will merely verify if a student has read any given book, the student will be asked to share the book with a parent. Whether you read the book or not is up to you, but we request that you at least discuss it with your child, so you can both move on to the next stage, which is to ask and answer three questions based on the reading.

Not just any type of questions, either, but challenging questions where you really need to think about the text, as in the examples given above about the medieval castle and Cinderella. Your child may make up the questions and you answer them, or you may ask the questions and have your child answer them, or you may split the asking and answering between you. We will be sending home a form on which you or your child can record the questions you come up with and the answers you give, and your child will then return the form to me in the library.

Every month we will have a reader recognition ceremony, similar to Terrific Kids, BUGS or IB student of the month, where certificates will be presented to the students at each grade level who have read the most books and completed the ask and answer forms. We will also present certificates to those student/parent combos at each grade level who, in our opinion (our in this case being me, Mrs. Miles, and our reading specialists) have come up with the best, most thought-provoking questions. At the end of the year we will have some sort of grand prize ceremony and celebration for all participants, students and parents, details TBD.

You may select whatever type of reading materials appeal to your child--fiction, non-fiction, graphic novels

--all we ask is that the books be at your child's reading level. If you would like help selecting a book, or could use a little more clarification about

the types of questions we're looking for, please feel free to contact me and I will do my best to help you. I realize this is a bit more complicated than the traditional type of reading program, but as an IB school we are always trying to push our boundaries a bit, and we're looking forward to seeing where we can go with this with your cooperation. Thanks, and stay tuned for further details, program start date, and the necessary forms, which we will also try to have

available for download from the website so you can print them off at home.

even at 32 degrees Fahrenheit (that's the temperature where water freezes and ice melts). That may include hats and gloves. Don't let your child complain of being cold when there's no reason for it. And remember to look at the Lost and Found in the auditorium vestibule for lost gloves, mittens, hats, scarves and even coats.
