Hello from Star Achievers!

Thank you for enrolling your children in the before- and after-care program at Shepherd. We are working to set a schedule for the month of October and will distribute it



when ready, as well as let you know our plans for special events taking place on Fridays and around holidays. An official newsletter will keep you up-to-date the first of each month beginning in November.

For now, please note the following important items:

First, please see the invoice sent to each family regarding tuition payment for October. Thank you for your prompt payments.

Second, Star Achievers follows the same disciplinary policy as the school uses during the day: the use of three tiers of violations and consequences such as time-outs, a note home to parents making you aware of the negative behavior and on up to suspension nor expulsion from the program for serious violations. A written policy will be provided to all families ASAP.

Last but not least, Star Achievers keeps safety in mind as the top priority for the program. All parents MUST sign out at the front desk BEFORE they pick up their child/ren. There are no exceptions to this safety policy. If the security guard or Ms. Lester is not available at the desk when you arrive, please wait until we note that you have identified yourself and signed out. We are working on a walkie-talkie system that will let the Star Achievers staff member with your child know you are present, are authorized to take the child out of the program, and ensure you do not walk around the building unable to locate your child quickly.

What a powerful week of teaching and learning at Shepherd Elementary School! We listened to recordings and videos of Paul Robeson and read about his life. Then more than 100 students (first through fifth graders) wrote letters to Pearson, the publisher of our "Making Music" textbooks, urging that Paul Robeson be included in the next music textbook. Robeson is not mentioned anywhere in our music textbooks.

Here are a few quotes from letters by Shepherd Elementary School students:

"I would like for you to put Paul Robeson in our music textbooks because he is very important. I think he is important because he has tried to set Americans free and stop war. He was a very famous singer/actor. And my class and I would love to find out hidden facts about him and his life. "— Chandler M., 5th grade

"I strongly believe that Paul Robeson should be in "Making Music" textbooks. Soon Paul Robeson will not be remembered as he should." -- Cyntia P., 4th grade

"I think Paul Robeson should be in our textbook because he was the first African-American to speak up and demand rights for African-Americans. #### **Inquirers**

Keep in mind that an Inquirer is someone who is curious about the world around them. They acquire the skills necessary to conduct inquiry and research and show independence in learning. Best of all, they actively enjoy learning and this love of learning is sustained throughout their lives. This month, challenge yourself to be an inquirer IN:

- Language Arts -- by inquiring and using language as the main way to learn about language.
- Mathematics by becoming curious and fascinated about the world of patterns, shape, and number; by using the skills of mathematics to conduct purposeful inquiry.
- Science & Technology by having a sense of wonder about the physical and the material world. By finding out how things work and using the scientific process to conduct purposeful inquiry.
- Social Studies by inquiring about society and culture.

What to do at home? Parents:

 Encourage areas of your child's interest by visiting the library to borrow books that explore these topics.

- Develop an understanding of the Internet. Work with your son or daughter when the Internet is being used and try to instill the understanding that some Internet sites are not reputable.
- Model being an inquirer. Admit when you don't know the answer to a problem or a question and seek out answers in front of your child.
- Catch your child being an inquirer. Make sure your child knows he/she has done something good. Expressing your approval is a powerful way to reinforce.

Dear Shepherd Parents and Caregivers,

Art activities for the first IB thematic units have drawn to a close and it is time for teachers and students alike to reflect and evaluate how our work turned out. Visual artists like me do a LOT of looking back since our artwork sits and stares back at us. Child artists take fearless joy in looking back. They almost always love their work and that of their peers. The processes and materials make them smile, particularly if the media is messy.

Second graders went to the school's garden in the last weeks to draw the flowering plants. Afterwards they were able to tell me how being there observing plants in person made the drawing exercise a special memory for them, and made part of the "movie in the mind." They happily told me about how they could notice the details of the plants and were better able to "copy" them in their sketches. Isn't that what we all want to do in life, take in the details and decide whether to consider them in our view of the big idea?

The arts teach children that small differences can have large effects, says art educator and philosopher

Elliot Eisner. In the art room second-grade parents will be able to see the big difference that direct observation makes in their children's drawing. I don't know who said this but I believe that "art is a special way of seeing," and it is something everyone can learn. So again this week I ask to you to keep talking to your child about what he or she is seeing in the world. It's in the details. Get out there and explore with your kids. Compare notes on what you see. It'll be fun.

If you're looking for me during parent-teacher conferences, I'll be inside the art room from 1 to 4 p.m.

Here's to an artful week. Remember, you gotta have art!



## **General Traffic Rules**

- Please arrive early to allow yourself plenty of time to find a parking space if you are walking your student to the gymnasium.
- Please do not stop and let students out in the crosswalk.
- Please do not stop in the middle of the street to let your student out of the car.



- Please use kind words and kind gestures.
- Please do not lay on your horn or yell out of your window.
- When exiting the car, students should exit on the curb side only. Students should not be expected to cross in front of your car or behind your car to get into the building.
- Please refrain from talking and texting during arrival and dismissal.

#### **Carpool Reminders**

#### Arrival

- Please arrive between 8:20 and 8:40 a.m. to drop off your student.
- Students should be dropped off on 14th Street in front of the school.
- Students should quickly proceed inside of the building via the blue gym doors (Jonquil) or the glass doors on 14th Street.
- Students should have their book bag, lunchboxes and other items gathered before you pull to the curb so that they can quickly exit the car.
- Parents, please remain in your car at all times. Safety Patrol and staff will assist with opening and closing doors as necessary.

#### **Dismissal**

- ◆ Parents may begin picking up their student at 3:15 p.m.
- To avoid traffic congestion, we ask that you do not arrive before 3:10 p.m.
- Please remain in your car at all times.

- ◆ If you are the first to arrive, please pull all the way up to the No Parking Sign located on 14th Street by the school marquee.
- ◆ Upon arrival, cars should pull directly behind the last car in the carpool line.
- ◆ Please do not leave open spaces in the carpool line. When a car leaves the line, all cars should pull up to close in the space.

## The Handbook Says: Healthy Snacks

Here's the first in an ongoing series of excerpts from the revised school handbook. This excerpt deals with the thorny issue every family tries to deal with: just what makes a "healthy" snack.

#### **Healthy School Snack Suggestions**

#### **Fruits**

Fruit is naturally sweet, so most kids love it. Fruit can be served whole, sliced, cut in half, cubed, or in wedges.

## Applesauce (Unsweetened), Fruit Cups, and Canned Fruit

These have a long shelf life and are low-cost, easy, and healthy if canned in juice or light syrup. Examples of unsweetened applesauce include Mott's Natural Style and Mott's Healthy Harvest line. Dole and Del Monte offer a variety of single-serve fruit bowls.

#### **Dried Fruit**

Try raisins, apricots, apples, cranberries, pineapple, papaya, and others with little or no added sugars.

#### **Frozen Fruit**

Try freezing grapes or buy frozen blueberries, strawberries, peaches, mangoes, and melon.

Hey, everybody! How's about sticking a catalogue or two in front of your co-workers' faces, imploring them to order something they don't really need because "it's for my kid's school"?

"Bueller? Bueller?"

Thought so.

One reason the 180 Fund was established was to get rid of sales drive after sales drive which generally bring about diminished returns. We've got better things to do with our lives than hawk wares we don't really believe in.

The PTA knows parents don't want to do that kind of thing, but that they'd go through a brick wall for their children's school.

While there will probably always be fundraising, Shepherd's fundraising program focuses on events where families and students can do things together. That's why there's Fall Fest. That's why there's Family Dinner Nights.

But the Big Daddy is the 180 Fund. We as parents take it upon ourselves to contribute to the general good of the whole school. Last year, the PTA pledged to kick in up to \$10,000 in office supplies so that the school could set aside more money for personnel in a year of budget cuts. And the PTA was able to make that pledge thanks to your 180 Fund contributions.

Two years ago, the PTA put up the lion's share of funding for an "Afterschool Academy" to boost the DC-CAS scores of students. As it turned out, D.C. Public Schools got out of the "Saturday Academy" business that year, so Shepherd would've been up

the creek without a paddle were it not for the creative thinking of parents and school officials, and families' contribution to the 180 Fund.

#### **Fruit Leathers**

Some brands of fruit snacks are more like candy than fruit, and should be avoided due to their high content of added sugars and lack of fruit. Brands to avoid include Fruit Rollups, Farley's Fruit Snacks, Sunkist Fruit Gems, Starburst Fruit Chews, Mamba Fruit Chews, Jolly Rancher Fruit Chews, Original Fruit Skittles, and

Amazin' Fruit Gummy Bears. Try Natural Value Fruit Leathers and Stretch Island Fruit Leathers,



which come in a variety of flavors and don't have added sugars.

#### **Fruit Salad**

Get kids to help make a fruit salad. Use a variety of colored fruits to add to the appeal.

#### **Popsicles**

Most so-called "fruit" popsicles have added sugars and should be reserved for an occasional treat. Look for popsicles made from 100% fruit juice with no added caloric sweeteners, such as



Breyers or Dole "No Sugar Added" fruit bars.

#### **Smoothies**

Blend fruit with juice, yogurt or milk, and ice. Many store-made smoothies have added sugars and are not healthy choices.

#### **Deliveries**

Deliveries of fresh fruit or platters of cut-up fruit are a convenient option offered by some local grocery stores.




